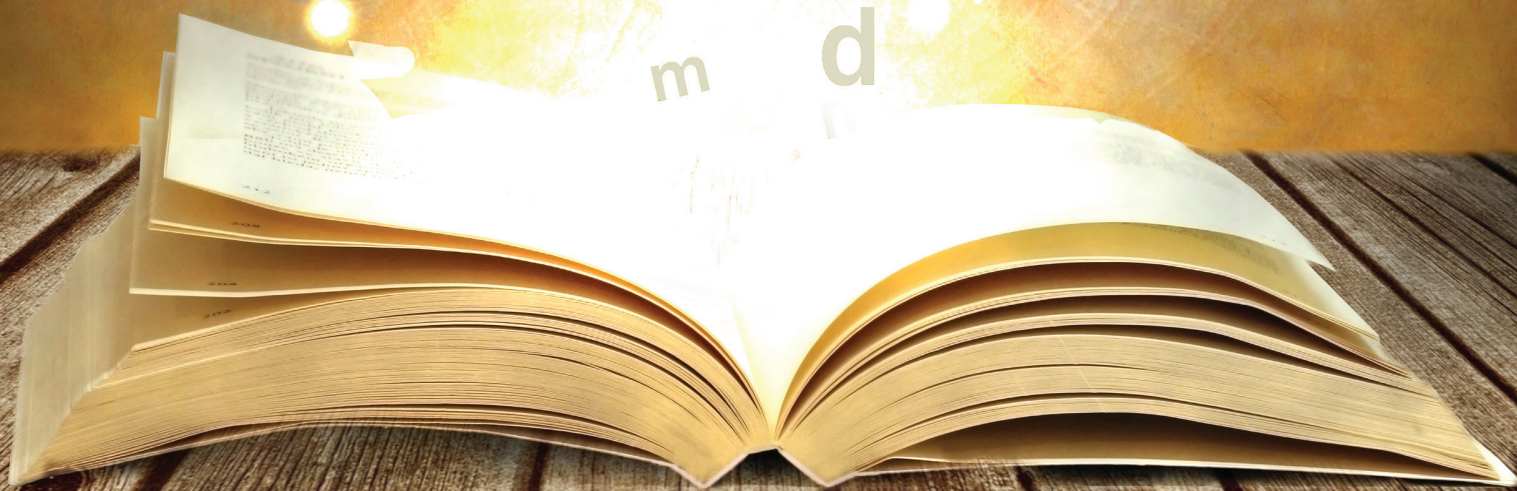

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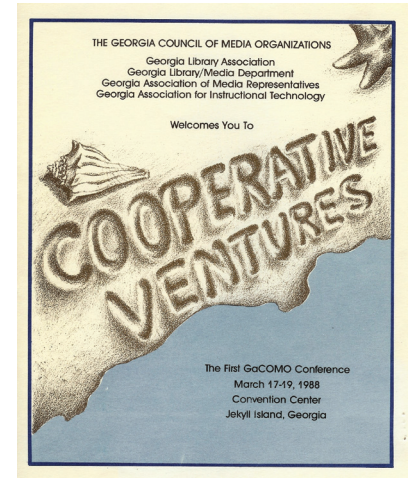
WELCOME!

The very first GaCOMO – Cooperative Ventures Conference sponsored by the Georgia Council of Media Organizations (COMO) was held March 17-19, 1988 at Jekyll Island. The Juanita Skelton Award is GAIT's highest recognition of achievements in higher education at the state or national level in instructional technology. GAIT/AECT Leadership Development Stipend is available to any active member of GAIT to be used for professional growth and development at the annual AECT Leadership Development Conference. The GAIT Technology

Innovation Mini-Grant is awarded to two current GAIT members and consists of grants from \$500-\$2000. The Goen-Sloan Scholarship is awarded annually to a GAIT member who is pursuing graduate studies in a media-related area. Awards traditionally are presented during ceremonies at the annual meeting of the association during Georgia COMO.

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GEORGIA LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

The Georgia Library Association (GLA) is an all-encompassing organization with membership from the academic, public, school, and special libraries communities. It includes professional and paraprofessional staff, public library trustees, and friends of libraries. GLA was founded in 1897 for the purposes of promoting public library funding, establishing a library training program in the state, and setting up a state commission to oversee the library interests of the state. Its current focus lies along similar lines, with legislative, financial, technological and library training issues, and advocacy for libraries of all types being among its chief concerns.

With over 700 members, GLA represents all library interests in Georgia. The Atlanta Emerging Librarians, the Carterette Series Webinars, Georgia Library Day, the GLA Mid-Winter Meeting and the state's participation in the ALA National Library Day are examples of major activities of the association. To cultivate the next generation of librarians, the Association offers MLIS students joint membership in GLA and ALA (American Library Association). GLA's official organ is the peer-reviewed journal The Georgia Library Quarterly.

The GLA Academic Library Division is a chapter of ACRL (the Association of College and Research Libraries). GLA also has memberships in, is affiliated with, or sponsors the following professional organizations: the American Association of School Librarians (AASL); the Freedom to Read Foundation (FTRF); the Georgia Association of Media Assistants (GAMA); the Library Leadership and Management Association (LLAMA), the Public Library Association (PLA); the Society of Georgia Archivists (SGA); and the Southeastern Library Association (SELA). Thus, GLA can draw upon considerable resources to facilitate workshops and other training programs for librarians, media specialists, and support staff.

GLA awards two scholarships annually to students enrolled in a program leading to an ALA-accredited Master's Degree in Library/Information Science. Noteworthy achievements of members and laypersons in the advancement of and advocacy for Georgia's libraries are recognized through the association's awards program.

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SOUTHEASTERN LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

Founded in 1920, the Southeastern Library Association is a regional library organization with members from Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, and West Virginia. SELA promotes cooperation and information sharing throughout the Southeast to improve library service region-wide.

SELA places a strong emphasis on communication and professional growth. SELA provides opportunities for members to develop leadership skills through participation in committees and roundtables; offers mentoring to new professionals; promotes continuing education; and disseminates information about job openings and library news through social media and its website, listserv, and Facebook page. In addition SELA publishes the peer reviewed journal *The Southeastern Librarian*.

SELA actively supports libraries and literacy with regional awards and scholarships. These include:

- The Honorary SELA Membership Award is conferred upon living individuals who have made outstanding contributions to the Association or to library development in the Southeast.
- The Charles E. Beard Award honors an individual outside the library profession who has made a significant contribution to the development or promotion of libraries in the Southeast.
- The Mary Utopia Rothrock Award acknowledges the exceptional contributions of an individual to library development in the Southeast.
- The Outstanding Southeastern Author Award recognizes authors for current works of literary merit.
- The Outstanding Southeastern Library Program Award recognizes an outstanding program of service in an academic, public, school, or special library in a Southeastern Library Association member state.
- The Hal Mendelsohn Award honors an individual for dedicated service to the Southeastern Library Association.
- The Ginny Frankenthaler Memorial Scholarship in Library Science is awarded to beginning professional librarians who possess potential for leadership and commitment to service in libraries in the Southeast.

Since 1952 SELA has sponsored the Southern Books Competition. Trade publishers, university presses, specialty publishers, and private presses located in the southeastern states are eligible to enter this competition.

ERIC FADEN

KEYNOTE ADDRESS: "VISUAL DATA, COPYRIGHT, AND THE ARCHIVE OF THE FUTURE"

Eric Faden is an Associate Professor of English at Bucknell University. He

teaches a wide variety of courses in film/media studies from introductory courses to advanced production seminars. He produces multimedia works that imagine how academic scholarship works as an audio/visual medium. He is currently developing a feature film and web-based project called Within The Law that recreates a lost 1917 silent film.



JONATHAN ALTER

ALL CONFERENCE LUNCHEON

Jonathan Alter is an award-winning author, reporter, columnist and television producer and analyst. He is the author of

three New York Times bestsellers: "The Center Holds: Obama and His Enemies" (2013), "The Promise: President Obama, Year One" (2010) and "The Defining Moment: FDR's Hundred Days and the Triumph of Hope" (2006), also one of the Times' "Notable Books" of the year. Since 1996, Alter has been an analyst and contributing correspondent for NBC News and MSNBC, appearing on-air two or three times a week. After 28 years as a columnist and senior editor at Newsweek, where he wrote more than 50 cover stories, Alter is now a twice-monthly columnist for the Daily Beast. He has also written for The New York Times, The Washington Post, The Washington Monthly, Rolling Stone, The Atlantic, The New Yorker, Vanity Fair, The New Republic, Esquire, Bloomberg View and other publications. He is an executive producer of "Alpha House," a half-hour political comedy created by Garry Trudeau and starring John Goodman that is available for viewing on Amazon.com. He is at work on a full-length biography of former President Jimmy Carter and is producing a documentary about the lives of legendary journalists Jimmy Breslin and Pete Hamill.

In August 2015, the East Georgia State College Library implemented a new tactic for gleaning usage statistics using Google Forms. This “home-grown” approach was both free and easy to implement and allows the library to glean both quantitative and qualitative information from our previously stagnant reference statistics. The Google Form enables the library to conduct a more in-depth analysis of data, allowing us to see how we assist our patrons at both a granular and high-level view and what other parts of the college we touch. The flexibility of the Google Form allows the library to adapt the form quickly when a new type of information would be beneficial to assess. By using the information gathered through the Google Form, we have been able to reinvent spaces, projects, and services as soon as the transaction is completed, creating a rapidity of changing service-levels that have delighted our users.

Self-publishing allows an author to skip the middle man (a publisher) who generally takes the lion's share of the profit. 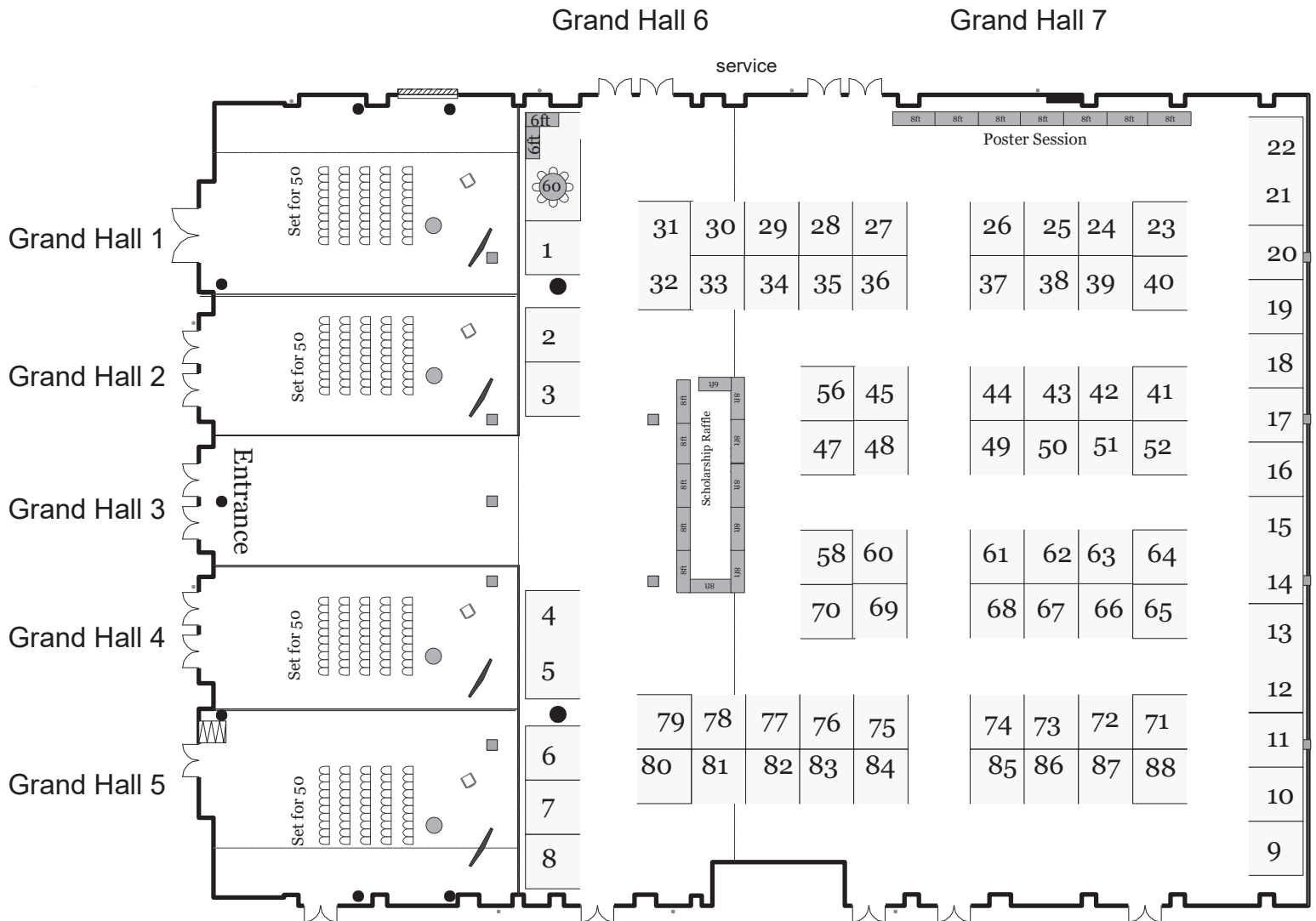

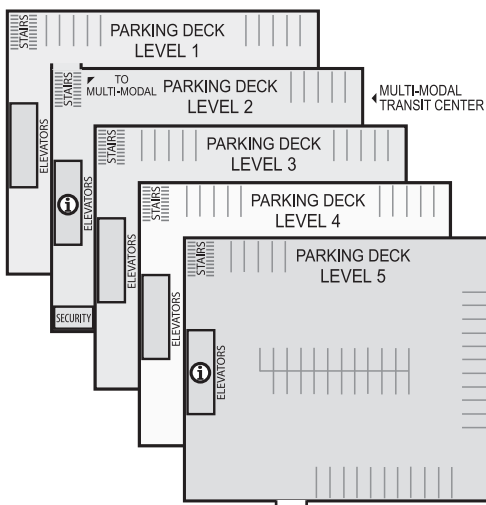
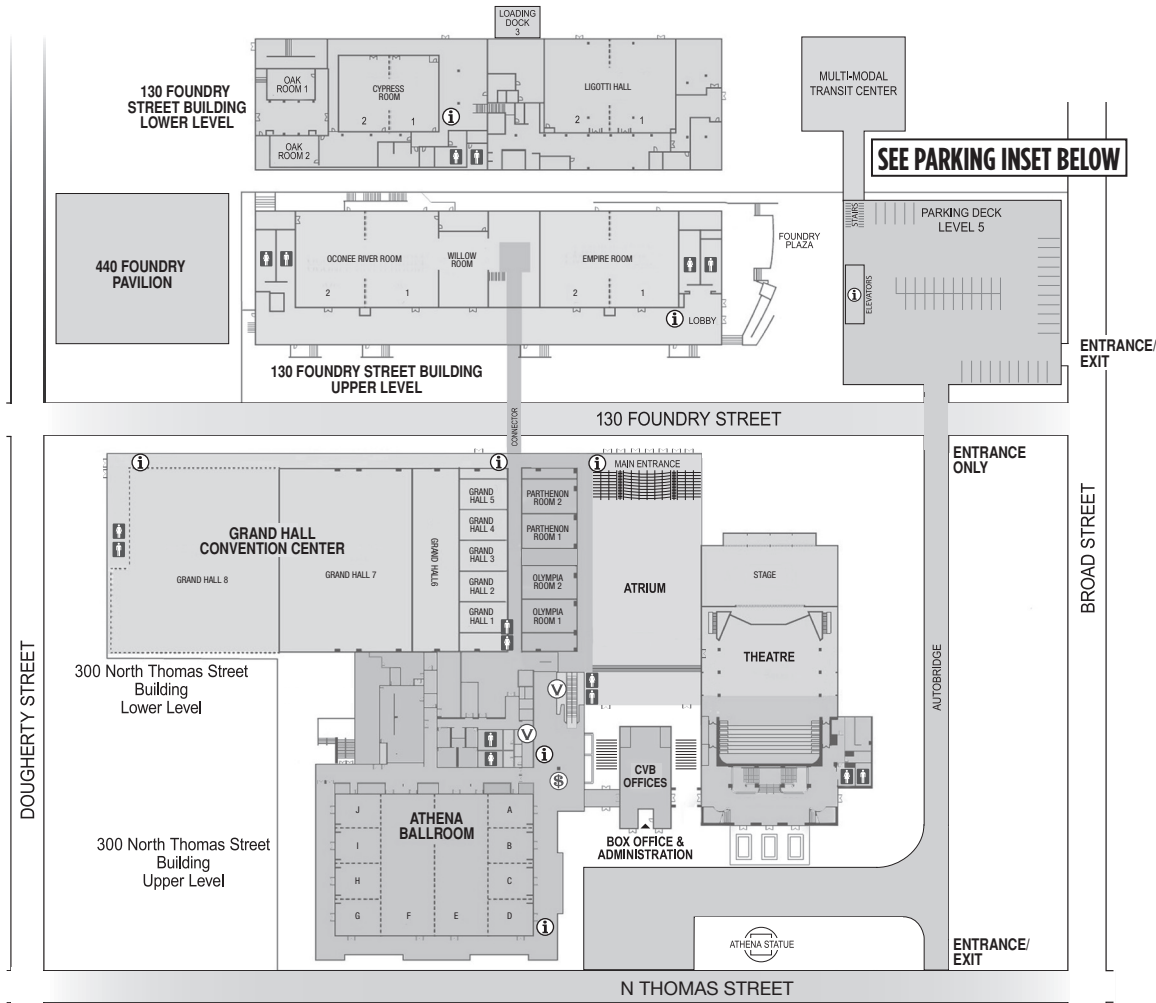
